HOUSE OF KEYS GENERAL ELECTION 2026

Hello, I'm Julia Bell. I am delighted to announce that I am standing for the House of Keys General Election 2026. I am a mother, a Mental Health Nurse, and a Cognitive Behavioural Therapist. I am also a proven advocate for people with dyslexia.

MY JOURNEY IN MANX POLITICS

My interest in Manx politics began in 2020 when I submitted my first Petition of Redress to Tynwald, calling for better identification and support for young people with dyslexia in education. Although progress initially stalled following a change in administration, I remained committed to achieving meaningful change.

In 2024, I submitted a second Petition of Redress, and founded the Dyslexia Advocacy Group IOM.

I presented detailed evidence to Tynwald Members, leading to a unanimous vote to establish a Select Committee. My work has already delivered system-wide improvements for thousands of children.

WHAT THIS WORK HAS ACHIEVED

- Two **public consultations** gathering local evidence and recommendations
- Systematic **phonics** instruction introduced across Key Stage 1
- A new **Inclusion Policy** (October 2024)
- Access to **assistive technology** for 11,000 students, which was a direct result of the relationships I had built with key stakeholders
- A published Tynwald report, containing **12 formal recommendations**, which was debated in Tynwald and approved in full

RECOGNITION

My petition was described as "**perfect**". I was encouraged to stand for the Legislative Council in 2025. Although I was not elected, several **Members of the House of Keys encouraged me to stand in the General Election 2026**, noting that my strengths lie in representation, policy, and delivering change. That experience strengthened my belief that I can best serve the Island through the House of Keys.

WHY I AM STANDING

I am standing in the 2026 General Election because I believe I am well-suited to serve — not only due to the encouragement of others, but also because I want to build on what I have already delivered as a public advocate, this time from within Tynwald.

I cannot promise to deliver every idea I support — meaningful change requires a majority support within Tynwald. However, collaboration and relationship-building are among my greatest strengths and were central to the success of the dyslexia campaign. I can promise evidence-based decision-making, listening to my constituents, and persevering to achieve change. I am renowned for persevering long after others give up. I hope my work on dyslexia demonstrates my credibility and commitment.

MY TOP PRIORITIES

- Better **education**
- Improved access to **health and social care** services
- Affordable **housing** and sustainable communities that will rebalance the ageing population

EDUCATION

Raising a child with Special Educational Needs in our current education system is a battle. I know, because it is my lived experience. **A fair education system is one that adapts to children, not the other way round.** The current system is not working for all children and young people — particularly those who are neurodiverse, experiencing mental health difficulties, or who do not fit a traditional academic model.

If elected, I will support:

- Implementation of the **12 approved recommendations** from the Select Committee on Dyslexia, Dyscalculia, Dyspraxia, and Dysgraphia
- Supporting alternative education pathways for students struggling with school attendance including those who do not fit the traditional academic route to learning
- Introducing clearer school performance measures which include being 'workforce ready', distinguishing outcomes for students with and without Special Educational Needs
- Stronger social media literacy in education, and support for legislation reducing online harm to young people
- Introducing opportunities from Key Stage 3 upwards, and re-introducing work-experience placements
- Strengthening safeguarding for home-educated children and collecting data on why home-educated children are on the rise
- Addressing bullying and cyberbullying in schools

HEALTH

Manx Care faces significant challenges, including pressure on hospital services, workforce shortages, long waiting times, cuts to service delivery, and increasing demand. Patients deserve accessible, high-quality healthcare that is sustainable, accountable, and responsive to the needs of the Island.

If elected, I will support:

- Strengthening accountability and transparency within Manx Care, including reviewing whether current financial pressures stem from underfunding, overspending, or structural issues
- Improving access to healthcare services including dentists. Introducing Pharmacy First, Community Wellbeing Hubs, and self-referral routes putting less pressure on GP services
- Strong focus on staff retention, and upskilling the workforce, by providing opportunities for further education to fill vacant posts
- Accessing treatment closer to home and reducing unnecessary hospital admissions
- Giving people with long-term conditions, or complex healthcare needs, greater choice and control over their care by introducing a Personal Healthcare Budget
- Increased availability of sheltered, residential and nursing home places, in addition to packages of care at home, to assist with safe hospital discharging
- Improving patient care through better information-sharing, consistent electronic health records, and stronger protections for staff who raise patient safety concerns
- Promoting prevention and early intervention to improve well-being and reducing long-term pressure on health services, for example, by promoting the Smile of Mann's supervised toothbrushing programme and extending this to other population groups such as older people in nursing homes

MENTAL HEALTH

I have broad experience in mental health. I have worked across primary, secondary and tertiary services in both hospital and community settings, supporting adults and older people. Increased investment in services has been welcomed and has delivered tangible improvements, including reduced waiting times for psychological therapies for both children and adults and the introduction of a single point of referral for children through the Talk Service. However, further work is needed as the demand for mental health services remains high. The Tynwald Youth Select Committee cites mental health care as one of the most relevant topics to young people on the Isle of Man and more than 6% of the Island's population is either in receipt of services or waiting for support. The World Health Organization estimates a global suicide rate of 9–10 per 100,000; the Isle of Man's 2023 rate of around 16.5 per 100,000 is notably higher than both UK and global averages, reflecting real lives and families affected across the Island. Suicide prevention

is therefore a public health priority, and strengthening early intervention and prevention would improve mental health outcomes at a population level.

If elected, I will support:

- Establishing a Tynwald Youth Select Committee inquiry into children and young people's mental health services, examining access, waiting times, early intervention, and whether current provision meets the needs of young people across the Island
- Developing Family Hubs to bring health, education, and family support services together in one place, making it easier for families to get the help they need, when they need it
- Peer support for neurodivergent young people and parenting programmes tailored to the specific challenges of raising children who are neurodiverse
- Adult neurodivergent pathway
- A review of the Mental Health Act to ensure it reflects modern human rights, autonomy, and best practice
- Specialised support, targeting patients who have chronic and enduring mental illness who are at risk of disengaging
- Better access to health psychology for people struggling with their mental health related to long-term conditions
- Reducing the risk of suicide in high-risk groups

WOMEN'S HEALTH

Ensuring health professionals have up-to-date knowledge across the female life span will improve outcomes, enhance patient care, and reduce long-standing inequalities.

If elected, I will support:

- Improved diagnosis and treatment of menstrual disorders, perimenopause, and menopause

FAIRER FUNDING FOR NURSING, RESIDENTIAL AND HOME CARE

Having worked for the Older Persons Mental Health Service, I have seen firsthand how the current system for funding residential and nursing care is expensive and unfair. This issue was highlighted by the Select Committee on the Funding of Nursing Homes (2015), yet, more than a decade later, the funding model remains unchanged. The Nursing, Residential and Home Care Report (2026) highlighted the significant cost of care, estimated at around £65,000 per year. Moreover, there is a 'cliff edge' between those who receive their care free of charge through means-testing and those who are required to exhaust their savings and, in many cases, sell their home to fund their care. The current structure of Social Security benefits creates financial disincentives for many people who wish to remain at home, encouraging some to move into care homes when they could continue living

independently with the right package of support. This approach is inconsistent with the Government's commitment to shifting care back into the community, a direction identified in the Independent Health and Social Care Review (2019) as beginning in 2011. Community-based care is often more cost-effective, aligns better with people's preferences, promotes independence, improves satisfaction, and can deliver better health outcomes.

If elected, I will support:

- Removing disincentives to people requiring care and support in their own homes, delivering on recommendation 16 of the Independent Health and Social Care Review
- A Free Personal Care Model or a Mixed Funding Model with a cap on the maximum amount individuals are required to contribute, protecting people's homes and a proportion of their income while ensuring a fairer approach to care costs
- Paying carers a living wage or minimum wage to reduce residential and nursing home care demand
- Increasing support for carers and strengthening partnerships with charities and third-sector organisations that provide vital services

HOUSING

The Tynwald Youth Select Committee represented the voices of young people aged 15–24. Committee Members identified housing as the main issue affecting young people. The housing crisis on the Isle of Man is increasingly characterised by rising property prices and limited supply, making it difficult for first-time buyers to enter the market. The average house price is now almost £400,000, around eight times the average annual wage and almost eleven times the average annual income of 18–25-year-olds.

In 2023, 43% of young people who did not intend to return to the Island cited a lack of affordable housing as their main reason, underlining its importance to retaining young people and attracting new talent. High housing costs are contributing to the out-migration of young people and making it more difficult to recruit skilled workers from overseas.

As a parent, I share the widespread concern about whether the next generation will be able to afford a home. As a healthcare professional, I also see firsthand how the housing crisis is affecting recruitment and the long-term sustainability of essential public services.

If the visions of Our Island Plan and the Economic Strategy are to be achieved, we need more homes and a much greater diversity of property types.

If elected, I will support:

- More homes to be built with greater diversity in types of properties being built. Smaller properties for single and childless households need to be prioritised
- Working closely with developers to make sure the right types of houses are built in the right places

- Minimum standards of living conditions that rental accommodation and social housing must meet
- Affordable and social housing, prioritising brownfield development before greenfield expansion
- Better access to first-time buyer schemes such as mid-rent, rent to buy, low deposit assistance and shared equity, to help low- to middle-income earners get on the property ladder
- A fully functioning rent-deposit scheme to ensure deposits are safeguarded by an independent body
- Incentives and disincentives to reduce the number of empty homes, prevent property dereliction, and encourage the redevelopment of vacant shops and surplus government buildings into housing
- A homelessness pathway supported by clear policy and an appropriate legislative framework, including dedicated accommodation pathways for care leavers, vulnerable young people, and people leaving prison

REBALANCING THE AGEING POPULATION

My interest in addressing the challenges of an ageing population is strongly influenced by working in a Dementia Specialist Service at Older Persons Mental Health Service, a role I found highly rewarding. However, this experience also gave me insight into the increasing demand an ageing population places on health and social care services, and the pressures this creates for service delivery and sustainability.

The ageing population is growing because the birth rate is falling and it is difficult to retain and attract young people and families to the Isle of Man. In 2025, the number of births in the Isle of Man was the lowest in over 100 years. Several reasons have been suggested, including that fewer women of childbearing age now live on the Island, while those who do are choosing to have fewer, or no, children, perhaps because of the cost of housing, childcare, and the general cost of living. If we do not take action to increase the number of births on the Isle of Man and attract and retain more young people and families, our ageing population will continue to grow. Currently, only 49% of the population is in work and, as the average age continues to rise, the number of working people will continue to fall.

If we do not rebalance our ageing population, then funding public services, social security benefits, and pensions, will become increasingly unsustainable.

If elected, I will support:

- Developing and implementing a Population Rebalancing Strategy, supported by clear policies that set out why rebalancing the Isle of Man's population is essential
- Moving the focus from population growth to population rebalancing, ensuring the Isle of Man has the right mix of skills, ages, and experience to support our economy and communities. Population growth may follow, but it should be a targeted outcome rather than the primary objective

- Infrastructure investment aligned with demand to ensure the Island can sustainably support population rebalancing
- Family-friendly policies to retain and attract working-age people, including greater availability and affordability of childcare. For example, Jersey provides tax-free childcare support; Sweden provides financial support to families caring for children; milestone payments could also be considered
- Newly graduated young people returning to the Isle of Man repaying their student loans through the taxation system, with the tax they would otherwise pay being used to offset their outstanding loan
- Attracting and retaining young people on the Isle of Man through better education, jobs, housing, and lifestyle opportunities
- Expanded on-Island further education opportunities including long-distance learning options to widen access to skills and qualifications
- Targeted promotion of the Isle of Man's strengths to young economically active people

IMMIGRATION

Since the introduction of the Worker Migrant visa route in 2018, immigration by foreign nationals to the Isle of Man has increased. The Worker (Seasonal) Migrant route, which operated for a short period, was vulnerable to abuse. Immigration must be well managed, lawful, and in the best interests of the Island. Those who come here and later become citizens should have the skills and commitment to make a positive contribution to our economy and society.

I welcome the changes to the Isle of Man visa route that came into effect on 1 June 2026. These reforms ensure that overseas workers qualify through either the Skilled Worker List or the Occupational Shortage List and meet minimum salary thresholds. The new labour market test requires employers to recruit locally and within the Common Travel Area before seeking workers internationally. The new Immigration Employer Compliance Policy requires both the business and the role to be genuine. The Government's commitment to strengthen visa routes over the next three years and reduce abuse of the immigration system must be fully implemented.

Immigration is essential if we are to address three significant demographic challenges: a declining birth rate, the continuing loss of young people, and an ageing population. Well-managed immigration will reduce the dependency ratio by increasing the number of economically active residents and help fill skills and occupational shortages.

If elected, I will support:

- Greater scrutiny of immigration applications, with ongoing monitoring of the effectiveness of immigration policy changes, and prompt action taken where emerging risks or threats are identified
- Targeted immigration to ensure those coming to the Isle of Man can support themselves while meeting the Island's social and economic needs

BORDER SECURITY AND REDUCING THE HARMS OF DRUGS

I am passionate about reducing the harms associated with substance misuse. Some years ago I gained sponsorship to visit San Patrignano in Italy. San Patrignano is widely regarded as one of the world's leading therapeutic communities for drug and alcohol rehabilitation. I learnt firsthand what they do and why it works, and I presented my findings to drug and alcohol services on the Isle of Man.

Organised crime groups target the Island because illicit drugs can command significantly higher prices than in neighbouring jurisdictions. There needs to be an increased focus on the detection of criminals before they enter the Island.

If elected, I will support:

- Appropriate checks at private aviation facilities and ports, including passenger identification for sea travel
- Better local data on drug use and harm to ensure policy decisions reflect real population needs
- A tightly regulated framework for prescribing cannabis-based medicines with strong clinical oversight
- Harm-reduction policy principles

THE CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM

The Criminal Justice System was independently reviewed in 2011 and 2023. Safety, Respect, Purposeful Activity, and Rehabilitation were assessed. In both reviews, Purposeful Activity and Rehabilitation were rated as 'not sufficiently good' or 'poor'. The 2024 Independent Review of the Criminal Justice System found significant improvements in safety but continued to identify concerns regarding rehabilitation and reintegration. There has been little meaningful improvement in rehabilitation and reintegration over more than a decade, despite a strategy committing to reform. The 2024 review also concluded that more must be done to address the underlying causes of offending, and to support prisoners in reducing the likelihood of reoffending.

Greater support must also be provided to protect victims, ensuring they receive timely information directly from the relevant authorities rather than through the media. In addition, delays in progressing cases through the courts and reaching final verdicts remain a concern.

If elected, I will support:

- Addressing the concerns highlighted in the 2024 independent review
- Stronger rehabilitation within the criminal justice system through improved access to psychological therapies, trauma-informed training for police and prison officers, and expanded opportunities for life skills, vocational training, education, and constructive activities
- Strengthening the probation service to ensure the safe and effective reintegration of offenders into the community

- Supporting a dedicated victim welfare officer for serious crimes to provide a single point of contact, improve communication, and deliver regular case updates

PUBLIC TRANSPORT, ROADS, SEA AND AIR TRAVEL

Public transport in Ayre & Michael is often unreliable and inconvenient, limiting its use and increasing road congestion and rural isolation. Many rural roads are in poor condition, with potholes, narrow lanes, and safety concerns.

The cost and reliability of air and sea travel also remain major issues for residents and businesses. The Isle of Man Government owns the Steam Packet Company because of its strategic importance to the Island. However, it has failed to use that ownership to deliver broader economic benefits.

Constituents have raised concerns that the cost of travelling on and off the Isle of Man, and the cost of transportation of goods, are extremely high.

If elected, I will support:

- Improved bus services in Ayre & Michael so they are more frequent, reliable, and better connected
- Better coordination of bus services across the Island
- Stronger maintenance and repair of rural and main roads
- A review of air and sea travel costs and accessibility
- A more affordable, reliable, and joined-up transport system across the Island

INTERNATIONAL CONCERNS IMPACTING OUR ISLAND

Many homes on the Isle of Man rely on heating oil, leaving households vulnerable to global events — such as conflict in the Middle East — which can drive up prices and create uncertainty of supply. This particularly affects vulnerable residents.

If elected, I will support:

- Working with energy and fuel suppliers to ensure fair pricing and transparency for customers
- Schemes that support vulnerable households struggling with heating costs
- Monitoring supply-chain risks and acting quickly when threats emerge

NATURE, BIODIVERSITY, AND CLIMATE CHANGE

The Climate Change Act requires future governments to continue making meaningful progress in reducing carbon emissions to achieve net zero. Climate change is already impacting weather extremes, food security, public health, biodiversity, and our economy. Reducing our carbon footprint is an investment in the health and well-being of our community and is vital to delivering the ambitions of Our Island, Our Future: Isle of Man Economic Strategy.

The Isle of Man is not getting the basics right. Our rates system does not incentivise reducing water use or household waste, as the charge remains the same whether

residents are careful with resources or not. Recycling is also disincentivised because it can be inconvenient, time-consuming, and, for many, incurs a charge for kerbside collection. In many European countries recycling is free, while residual waste is charged by weight or volume. The Isle of Man has the lowest recycling rate of all surrounding jurisdictions, including Jersey and Guernsey, highlighting the need for a system here that better rewards sustainable behaviour.

If elected, I will support:

- Energy efficiency schemes that help households reduce fuel bills
- Island-wide kerbside recycling and fair water charging
- Protecting and restoring our natural environment through peatland restoration, tree planting, and support for blue carbon projects that use healthy marine ecosystems to capture and store carbon
- Better flood-risk planning to protect homes, farmland, businesses, and infrastructure from the increasing impacts of extreme weather
- Modernising the Wildlife Act 1990 to ensure nature is improved, not just protected
- Listening to constituents' views on the windfarm proposal and representing the majority view in Tynwald

ECONOMY, GOVERNMENT EFFICIENCY, AND VALUE FOR MONEY

Without a successful economy it is not possible to deliver on aspirations, and services risk being cut. Over the last 10 years there has been a substantial reliance on reserves. Constituents have consistently raised concerns that taxpayers' money is not used wisely and that Government does not deliver genuine value for money. Although the Government has committed to achieving at least £10 million in savings by the end of 2025/26 — and £50 million over five years — through its Efficiency Programme, many people remain unconvinced that progress has been sufficient.

The Economic Review Committee stated that, under the 2011 administration, the size and cost of the public sector were reduced through redundancies. The Committee recommended that Tynwald repeat this approach, arguing that the size and scope of Government must be reduced.

In addition, Our Island, Our Future: Isle of Man Economic Strategy has an objective to create and fill 5000 new jobs by 2032. The strategy should specify what counts as a job, what sectors, what skill levels, what salary bands, whether public or private, and whether net or gross job creation is intended. Without this, "5000 jobs" is not a meaningful metric.

If elected, I will support:

- Defining clear parameters for the 5000 new jobs, which should be advertised to Isle of Man residents before recruiting from overseas
- Reducing the size and cost of the public sector

- Requiring Departments to examine which services are necessary, and which services can be stopped, and to evidence that all activities deliver benefit to the public
- Publication of tender prices on capital projects to strengthen public confidence in competitive procurement
- Financial penalties for contractors missing deadlines without valid justification, ensuring accountability for delivery
- Strengthening scrutiny of commissioned job contracts

LOCAL MATTERS IN AYRE & MICHAEL

MHK Visibility and Community Engagement

If I'm elected, I'll be easy to reach, and I'll hold regular political surgeries so people can speak to me directly. I am committed to understanding local concerns and representing them fairly. I will also work in partnership with Local Authorities. I know from personal experience how difficult it can be for members of the public to drive change. If elected, I will remember that experience, and work to make the system more responsive and accessible. The public should not have to fight so hard to be listened to!

Coastal Erosion

The Isle of Man Government's response to the Climate Change Risk and Opportunities Assessment states that it will continue to "protect heritage sites, such as old buildings and coastlines, especially those vulnerable to flooding and erosion" while a Climate Change Adaptation Strategy is developed. Coastal erosion is a significant issue in Kirk Michael, and cliff-climbing accelerates erosion while creating serious safety risks.

If elected, I will support:

- Targeted by-laws to protect coastal erosion
- Public education
- Liaising with Kirk Michael Local Authority and Tynwald about what can be done to slow down coastal erosion

Amenities

The loss of essential services and amenities across Ayre & Michael has had a detrimental impact on community connection, independence, and the long-term sustainability of rural communities. The decline in local facilities may be contributing to reduced resident numbers. Kirk Michael experienced a 12% decrease in its resident population between 2011 and 2021, whilst Bride experienced a 10.5% decrease in its resident population during the same period (The Isle of Man Population Atlas 2). There has been improvement to the Bride Play Park which is now more accessible for children with disabilities. However, there remains a shortage of accessible facilities elsewhere in Ayre & Michael, limiting inclusion

and equal participation in community life. Our Island Plan has a commitment to make the Island a more attractive place to live and work in, but this needs to be extended across Ayre & Michael.

If elected, I will support:

- The restoration and long-term sustainability of community services such as postal access, ATM machines, pharmacies, recycling facilities, a mobile library service, pubs, parks, access to village shops, and the refurbishment of **Ramsey District Cottage Hospital**
- Community events in rural areas, including adequate toilet and shower facilities at **Sulby Claddagh**
- Improving accessibility for people with disabilities
- Restoration of the old railway tracks to make them accessible for walkers and cyclists

Farming and Agriculture

Farming and agriculture support food security, employment opportunities, hospitality, and food retail sectors. However, farmers are not supported enough, evidenced by the Manx National Farmers Union petition. Local food security is at risk, with unreliable supplies from Isle of Man meats, and some butchers have had to source meats from UK suppliers.

If elected, I will support:

- Delivering a sustainable meat plant that strengthens food resilience, provides fair returns for farmers, supplies high-quality local meat at the right price, and builds strong partnerships with farmers, butchers, and suppliers
- Strengthening and tightening the law to minimise livestock-worrying by dogs by creating clearer enforcements and meaningful penalties for irresponsible dog ownership
- Improved public awareness and responsible dog control measures to help protect livestock and rural livelihoods
- Initiatives aimed at young farmers
- Development and adoption of best agricultural practice
- Strengthening local food production, with their produce being available in schools, hospitals, government canteens, and retailers
- Developing strategic Manx food hubs and farmers' markets across the Isle of Man, with an online ordering platform connecting consumers directly with local producers
- Prioritising the regeneration of our towns rather than further expansion into the countryside
- Maintaining public footpaths

ARE YOU REGISTERED TO VOTE?

The deadline to register to vote in the September House of Keys General Election is Tuesday 25 August 2026.

You can register if you:

- have lived on the Isle of Man for at least 12 months, and
- are aged 16 or over, and
- are legally eligible to vote
